NA

April 28th 1916 Compton Hut was opened by Mrs Frances Loder representing Loder and Mrcoline who had donated the Hut. She handed over a cheque for an additional £125 to meet the extra costs of the Hut and to provide extra accommodation. Mr and Mrs A.H. Skinner, from Bristol, are to take charge.

May 2nd 1916 an extension to the Hut at Hurdcott to provide a club room for officers and a Quiet Room for the men needed £400. (F.J.Fedarb) The Committee recommended that if a sufficient number of officers were prepared to pay a subscription the scheme could be carried through.

October 24th 1916 Manor Farm, Fovant was given £100 for a Quiet Room.

November 14th 1916 F.J.Fedarb wrote of the need for small guest hut t Fovant and the Committee recommended that further enquiries be made as to the probable cost. (pencilled marginal note is '£400')

Nov.28th 1916 5 Huts in the Fovant area needed new rooves.

No. 12 Camp Fovant (? Hurdcott) a small hut for £650 subject to a specific gift being available.

Fovant Central – erection of stock room, enlargement of kitchen etc. Approximately £125. Recommended.

Dec. 12th 1916 (Minutes of the Finance Committee) Huts sanctioned conditionally.

Fovant Camp No 12 £650 (subject to gift) Hurdcott and Fovant £100 (NZ gifted £100)

April 12th 1917 Extension to Hurdcott (No.6 Camp) £200, subject to a gift. Sir Henry Proctor and Mr Yapp, Committee members, said they had recently seen the hut on their tour of Salisbury Plains and were satisfied that the extension was urgently needed in view of the large number of Australian troops using it. The request was sanctioned immediately.

May 8th 1917 Accommodation at Hurdcott No 6 Camp to be increased as it is urgently needed.

Oct.23rd 1917 F.J.F. requested an extension to the small West Farm and Manor Farm Huts at a cost of no more than £200 each. Sanctioned.

5 optical lanterns with electric illuminations at £13.10.9 each for the Salisbury Plains YMCAs.

A letter was received from the Australian YMCA pointing out that they were providing 60% towards the cost of the Concert Parties on the Salisbury Plains.

Nov 13th 1917 After some discussion it was agreed that the Australian YMCA should take over control of the Australian centers at and Hurdcott Hut (Camp No.9) (a double hut)satisfactory terms have been agreed.

Nov 28th 1917 The question was raised as to how much the Australians had paid towards Concert Parties.

Jan 8th 1918 The Australian YMCA have paid £690 up to 31st Oct 1917. Since then the Australians were organising their own concert arrangements.
